HEDS Alumni Survey – Five and Ten Years Post Graduation Institutional Research and Assessment Connor Dowd and Polly Albright April 2017

In Spring 2016, the Earlham College alumni identifies as 5-years and 10-years post graduation were invited to complete the HEDS Alumni survey. This report compares responses from Earlham with responses of alumni from 48 other institutions including Allegheny College, DePauw University, Kenyon College, Luther College, St. Olaf College, and Willamette College.

Out of 895 invitations, 306 alumni responded from the 5-year cohort for a rate of 34%. Out of the 1738 invitations, 404 alumni responded from the 10-year cohort for a rate of 23%. The comparison group consisted of 1,667 respondents in the 5-year cohort and 864 in the 10-year cohort.

Current Primary Activity

All respondents are most likely to be employed full-time for both the 5- and 10-year cohorts. Nearly 53% of Earlham alumni were employed full-time in the 5-year cohort and 67.4% of the 10-year cohort. The next most frequent activity is attending graduate school full-time. Earlham alumni lag in full-time employment by 16.8% (5-year) and by 12.8% (10-year). For both cohorts, Earlham alumni are more likely to be either employed part-time or attending graduate school.

Plans for Future Degrees

The vast majority of respondents are planning to pursue, or have received, a higher degree. Earlham alumni have earned fewer advanced degrees in nearly all categories.

Volunteer Work or Community Service

All respondents engage in volunteer work at approximately the same rate. Thirty-three to 35% of all respondents from both the 5- and 10-year cohorts volunteer at least monthly.

Personal Relationship Status

Earlham alumni are more likely to be single or living with a partner, and less likely to be married than respondents of the comparison group. In terms of marriages, there is a 20% difference between the Earlham and the comparison group 5-year respondents and a 23% gap for the 10-year respondents.

Number of dependent children

Earlham respondents are less likely to have children than the comparison group. At ten years 82.8% of Earlham alumni

have no children, which is 23% greater than the comparison group.

Non-classroom and Informal Contact and Interactions with Faculty

Most respondents were satisfied with their interactions with faculty. Overall, Earlham respondents reported slightly higher positive interactions. Both the 5- and 10-year Earlham cohorts reported 7% higher than the comparison groups that faculty had a positive influence on personal growth, values, and attitudes. Earlham alumni also reported at approximately 5%

higher rate that faculty had positively influenced intellectual growth and interest in ideas.

In class experiences

All of the groups reported similar in class experiences, with the exception of students challenging each others' ideas in class. Both the 5- and 10-year Earlham cohorts reported about 15% higher that they challenged others' views often or very often compared to the comparison group respondents.

Respondents' Undergraduate Major

For these Earlham Alumni, the highest concentrations for major area of study lie in the Social Sciences, Humanities and Biological Sciences. While peer respondents' major areas are slightly more evenly spread out, they maintained a heavy preference for Social Sciences, Humanities, and Biological Sciences as well.

When did you obtain your first paying job after Graduation

Earlham 5-year group found their first job while still enrolled at the same rate as the comparison group, while the 10-year was lacking by 11%, however, within the first 6 months of graduation both groups were on par with their respective comparison groups.

Paying Jobs since Graduation

In the 5-year cohort, Earlham alumni were more likely, by 8%, to have had only one job. However, the 10-year cohort was significantly more likely to change jobs with over 12% more alumni having 5 or more jobs.

Aspects of first paying job

The comparison groups respondents were more likely than Earlham respondents to identify their first paying job with all of the aspects below, with a particularly wide split in the "satisfying" category with 31.4% of 5-year and 43.1% of 10-

year Earlham alum as satisfied compared to 58.4% and 57.8% respectively, of comparison respondents.

Aspects of current job if different from first job

While the first paying job showed a split between Earlham alumni and the peer group, this question indicates, that five or 10 years later, Earlham alumni have gained much ground in terms of "meaningful" and "satisfying" employment. However, while the 10-year cohort has reached parity with the comparison group, the 5-year cohort lags by 17% in meaningful work and 15.8% in job satisfaction.

Gross Annual Income

Earlham alumni lag behind the comparison respondents, especially at the higher income levels. Twenty-one percent of Earlham alumni (10-years out) earn over \$60,000 per year, while almost half (46.1%) of the comparison group earns over \$60,000.
