

## **TEN PRINCIPLES OF COLLABORATION** (5.16.18)

- 1.) **Seek to discover rather than try to invent.**  
Be open. Observe.  
Notice what is already there.  
Everything you need is already available to you, you just have to find it.
  
- 2.) **Accept all offers.**  
Say “Yes.” Don’t deny. Leave your critic at the door.  
Suspend judgment and open yourself to possibilities.
  
- 3.) **Listen actively to your partners.**  
As Stephen Covey says, “Seek first to understand, then to be understood.”  
Listen with your eyes and your ears -- people communicate with more than words.
  
- 4.) **Make your partners look good.**  
Support. Facilitate. Nurture.  
Encourage growth by taking the focus off yourself – make your partner a priority.
  
- 5.) **Be specific and obvious.**  
Speak your truth.  
Clarify what you’re committed to.  
Take ownership of your own viewpoint. Name what you see.
  
- 6.) **Find something tangible to do.**  
Take Action.  
Do something specific that will transform ideas into action.  
Get out of the bleachers and onto the court.
  
- 7.) **Be willing to explore unknown territory.**  
Seek adventure!  
Responsible risk-taking opens new possibilities.  
Face the dragon! He’s the one who has the most to teach you.
  
- 8.) **Rejoice in mistakes.**

Learn. Adapt. Grow stronger.

Take advantage of the learning laboratory.

Society may not reward mistakes but the creative process thrives on it.

The greatest home-run hitters of all time also acquired the greatest number of strike-outs.

**9.) Commit yourself fully and outrageously.**

Go for it!

Enjoy yourself thoroughly *and* fall flat on your face.

Why waste your time on kinda/sorta? You can make another choice later.

**10.) Trust yourself. Trust the Process.**

Honor your impulses-- you know more than you think you do.

Listen to you partners-- they know more than you think they do.
